DR. E. CLYDE WHITLOCK

CHOSEN TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Dr. E. Clyde Whitlock was named Teacher of the Year at the Golden Anniversary Convention at Brownsville in June, 1964.

At the Student Affiliate Day luncheon he was given the "red carpet" greeting. Student Affiliates honored him by presenting him with a plaque in recognition of his many years of conscientious labors in their behalf. Dr. Whitlock set up the theory requirements as found in the Texas Education Bulletin No. 589 for public school music students.

Before I tell you any more, please turn to pages four and five and look at the pictures of the Convention. At the upper left you will see Dr. Whitlock being escorted by two Student Affiliates on a "red carpet" that was rolled out as he was approaching the head table.

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CHARTER MEMBER

Augusta Bates Coleman of Waxahachie, prominent piano instructor, organist and voice coach in this area of Texas, has now retired from active teaching and is a resident of the Fireside Rest Home in Hillsboro, Texas.

Born in Chattanooga, Tenn., one of five daughters of the late Creed P. Bates, Chattanooga attorney, and Mrs. Bates, Mrs. Coleman began playing the organ for Sunday School at the Methodist Church where her father was chairman of the board of stewards by the time she could reach the pedals.

She was graduated from Chattanooga schools and spent seven years in Europe in piano studies. She was a pupil of Leschetizky in Vienna. A great friend of May Peterson and Oscar Seagle, she served as their accompanist on concert tours, especially in Texas cities.

Mrs. Coleman came to Waxahachie as head of the Piano Department at Trinity University, a position she held more than two decades. She resigned this post for a year's study at Julliard Conservatory of Music in New York City. On her return to Waxahachie, she began private classes in piano and voice. She organized and coached the Waxahachie Piano Ensemble, a group known throughout the area, in concert programs.

In addition to her work as pianist, she served as organist for the First Methodist, Central Presbyterian and First Baptist Churches in Waxahachie.

IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. S. A. Clift, president of the Ellis County Music Teachers Association passed away on March 1, 1964 of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Mrs. Clift, a native Ellis Countess, a charter member of the E.C.M.T.A., lived in Waxahachie for forty-eight years.

She was a graduate of the Trinity University School of Music, and studied with David Guion at the Rocky Mountain Artists Colony in Estes Park, Colorado for two seasons. She had refresher courses in Dallas, San Antonio and New York City.

Stephen also has been soloist with the Amarillo Symphony Orchestra and has won all the five trophies in the annual piano contest sponsored by the Mu Phi Epsilon chapter of Southern Methodist University.

He was the regional winner in the southwest area for the Stillman-Kelly scholarship award, and was chosen recently as best Junior High Accompanist in Dallas in a contest sponsored by the Dallas School District.

He has achieved Critic's Circle rating in the National Guild Auditions for eight years, and has been first place winner in the Biennial Piano Recording Competition.

In the Youth Recreation Hall, Mrs. Evelyn Cook Bell, Austin, and Mrs. Macy B. Reid, Corpus Christi, listed names and pinned numbers on contestants in Sections 1 and 2 of the Young Keyboard Jr. Quiz.

In Stillman Town Hall, Mrs. Kathryn Arvin, Harlingen, and Mrs. Kenneth Bennight, Corpus Christi, registered and numbered contestants for Sections 1 and 2 of the Keyboard Jr. Quiz.

Promptly at 8:00, in a hush of nervous expectancy, the quizzes began!

In Section 1, Young Keyboard Jr., Youth Recreation Hall, Mrs. L. C. Kuhn, Austin, plied the questions while Mrs. Antoinette Roebuck, Austin, wielded the scoring pencil. For the Young Keyboard Jr. contestants, the themes were displayed on large posters, Miss Mary Elizabeth Challes played the themes and each contestant was asked to identify two themes, giving the name of the work and its composer. The Keyboard Jr. contestants were each asked

to identify their two themes by sight alone. The older contestants identified their themes so quickly that time allowed two more rounds of questions.

Winners were announced at the Student affiliate luncheon.

Congratulations were in order for the six finalists who had studied well and were "quick thinkers."

Many expressions of thanks went to private teachers and parents who helped to prepare the quiz contestants and to the Keyboard Jr. Quiz "staff" of 13 teachers who administered the state contests.
